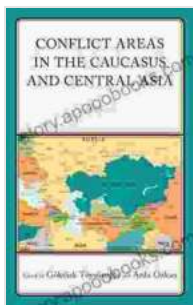


Conflict Areas In The Caucasus And Central Asia

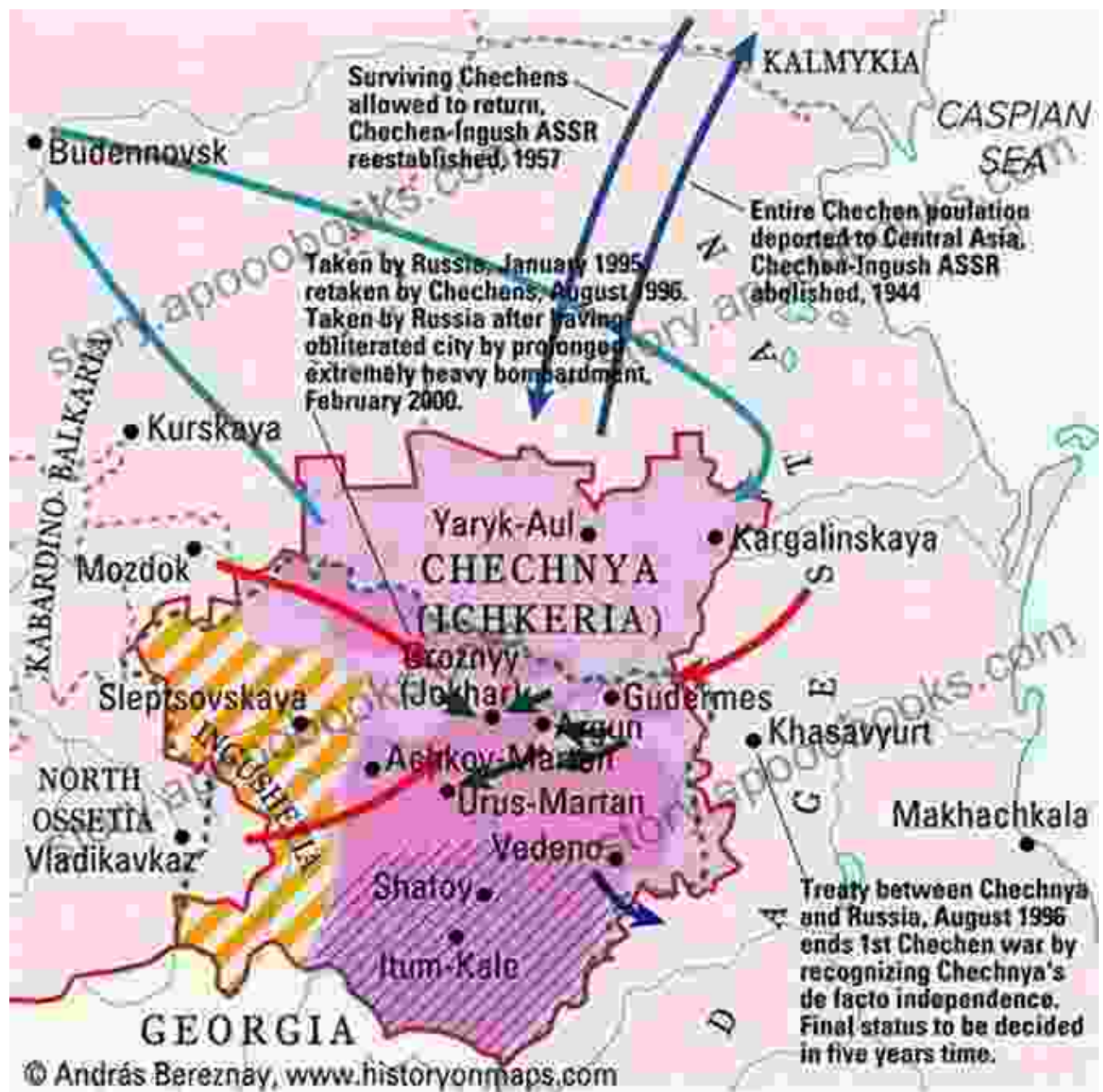


Map of Abkhazia and South Ossetia, two breakaway republics within Georgia.

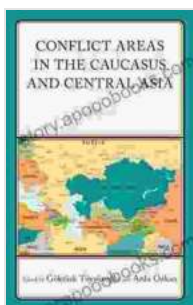
Map of Central Asia, a region that includes Kazakhstan, Uzbekistan, Turkmenistan, Kyrgyzstan, and Tajikistan.

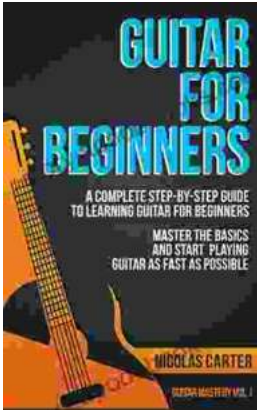
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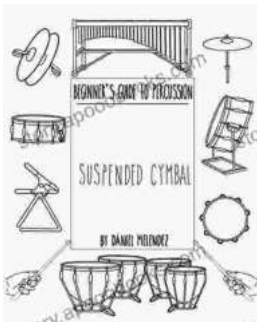
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
